Wildflower Family in the Spotlight

At the annual Wildflower meeting, members of the Board, Advisory Board and volunteers were treated to a guest appearance by one of the families we serve. Deb Hurley-Jones and her children, Isabella (14) and Jordan (12), spoke about the impact that Wildflower has had on their lives.

Deb and her children first came to Wildflower in 2005 – Deb's husband Gary, a stay-at-home dad, passed away in June of that year. Deb reached out to Cyndi through a social worker at her son's day-care and her family became one of our first scholarship recipients.

The next summer, Wildflower assisted Deb with the application process to enroll her children at Belmont Day School Summer Program, which they have been attending every summer since.

Jordan will tell you that going to Belmont Day has been the "most important thing in his life." Deb says that the experience allowed him to dream of different possibilities for his life and has given him a greater level of self-confidence.

For Isabella, Belmont Day provided the opportunity to develop a larger circle of friends, which has helped during these sometimes socially difficult teenage years. Isabella also appreciated the chance to be "normal" at camp, as opposed to being treated in a "special" way at school by those who knew of her loss.

Support from Wildflower also allowed Deb to send Isabella to an overnight drama camp in Maine this past summer. This gave her an

opportunity to expand her passion for acting and have a glimpse into an even larger picture of the world.

Deb maintains that she would never have been able to provide these experiences for her children without the support of Wildflower and she's quick to point out that it isn't just the financial support that has made a difference to her and her children. She is truly



grateful for *all* the support she has received, all during a time when she was grieving and overwhelmed with the responsibilities of being a single parent. Both children are looking forward to next summer.

With the kids more settled in their lives, Deb has also been able to take the time to consider her own health, taking better care of herself and feeling more confident. This past year, the family appeared on a nationally broadcast TV show, "Losing It with Jillian" and just returned from a cruise with the host of the show, where they all felt like celebrities! "Everyone wanted to talk to us...it was kind of crazy," says Deb. Looking into the bright, smiling faces of the family, it is hard to imagine the loss they've endured – evidence that Wildflower's mission to restore the promise of summer for children like Isabella and Jordan is all worthwhile.
